# WORK STARTS ON CREATING A NEW LOOK SCHOOL LIBRARY

The walls of the old ICT Suite are now awash with colour as work has started on the relocation of our school library. Bristol-based mural artist, Andy Council, has now completed a magnificent image of a hawk, complete with well-known Hawkesbury landmarks.

Andy came to the school in May to hold a series of workshops and to conduct research to see which items to include. Among the places of interest are the school, St Mary's church, the war memorial and the skate park. Westonbirt Arboretum and Badminton House also feature on the wings.

The plan is for the library to be moved from its existing site in the 'Bookery' outside Hawk class. Spitfire Homes, who commissioned the artist, are currently working on a scheme with their interior design team which will compliment the mural and provided the finishing touches to the new library.

The PTA have been actively involved in the project as well. We would like to thank them for their help in raising money for new books. Thanks must also go to Nicky Adams for her support in bringing new life to our old bookcases, which will help refresh our reading shelves in the school.



## READING SPONSORSHIP EVENT RAISES MONEY FOR NEW BOOKS

The children at Hawkesbury School have read their way to raising lots of money in an exciting initiative co-ordinated by our fantastic PTA. The Ready, Steady Read was a reading challenge set up by Usborne Books that invited children to be sponsored for achieving a range of reading targets during the spring.

Once the sponsorship was collected in, we were awarded an additional 60%'s worth of book titles. Our initial spending total was £1289, but this was later raised to a remarkable £1761 thanks to some generous late donations.

The school is now able to buy a range of exciting new nonfiction titles that will soon grace the shelves of our new library.



We would like to thank everyone for their support with this project. There are so many wonderful nonfiction titles now available for younger readers and this project has enabled us to buy an impressive 187 books.


## ARTIST WORKSHOP MAKES A SPLASH

Andy Council, the mural artist selected to create the artwork in our new library, came to Hawkesbury School last month to deliver a series of workshops to all the classes.

He shared his portfolio of past projects, including work carried out in Bristol, London, Belfast and Mexico. He then went on to explain his process of creating artwork. Pupils asked him a range of excellent questions about his techniques, the decisions behind his ideas and his preferred style.

In the second half of the workshops, children were asked to choose an animal and create their own drawings in Andy's style. They were also shown a slideshow of local Hawkesbury landmarks that they could add to their image.

Our artist was clearly very impressed by the quality of the children's work as well as the creativity that they used when coming up with imaginative ideas for their detail.



## RECOMMENDED READS


Here are some more books that are favourites with the staff at Hawkesbury.

This has been my favourite book since I was little, and still a firm favourite now.






#### **HAWKESBURY UPTON LITERATURE FESTIVAL (HULF)**
